To form the present perfect tense, we need to use the simple present tense of

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the auxiliary verb 'have' or 'has' based on whether the noun being referred to is plural or singular. The past participle of the verb follows the auxiliary verb. We can also write as: have/has + past participle. Let us see some examples,

The present perfect continuous (also called present perfect progressive) is a

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verb tense which is used to show that an action started in the past and has continued up to the present moment. The present perfect continuous usually emphasizes duration, or the amount of time that an action has been taking place.

Definition of the present perfect tense

The present perfect is used to indicate a link between the present and the past.

The time of the action is before now but not specified, and we are often more interested in the result than in the action itself.

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Present perfect - EF

In the perfect tenses, the verb (to) have is always the auxiliary verb. In the present perfect tense, the main verb is in the past participle form. This is not difficult for regular past tense verbs. For regular verbs, the past participle form of the verb is the same as the past tense verb, so you just add -ed!

The tenses simply show the time of an action. Present Perfect Tense is used to express an event that started in the past and the impact of the event is now continuing (or a long-running event that started in the past and is still going on).

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This tense is used to express actions completed recent past.

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
