Greek patristic tradition generally interprets the Pauline notion of dikaiosyne as "righteousness," rather than as "justice" in the forensic sense. That is, the term refers first to God's own quality of righteousness, understood more as an expression of love and mercy than as one of divine justice that must be "satisfied."
